UN Human Rights Council: Thirty-Fifth Session Item 4: Human rights situation that requires attention Oral Intervention: Cairo Institute for Human Rights Studies 15 June 2017

Mr. President,

The Cairo Institute for Human Rights Studies (CIHRS) would like to call attention to the alarming situation of human rights in Egypt. The government's harsh crackdown on human rights defenders and organizations threatens to annihilate Egypt's independent human rights groups.

The authorities continue to use Case 173 of 2011 (the foreign funding case) to wrongly pursue and eliminate Egyptian human rights organizations through politically motivated charges, some of which bear sentences of 25 years in prison. Human rights defenders from more than 37 organizations are facing travel bans, asset freezes and interrogations with a chilling effect on their capacity to protect human rights in the country. <sup>2</sup>

In May, the investigation judge summoned Mohamed Zaree, the Egypt Office Director of the Cairo Institute,<sup>3</sup> who had already been under travel ban for a year. Zaree was charged because of his engagement in the Human Rights Council's own Universal Periodic Review of Egypt.<sup>4</sup> This is a clear case of reprisal, despite Egypt's current membership in the Human Rights Council and its acceptance of many recommendations arising from the same 2014-15 UPR.<sup>5</sup>

Egypt's crackdown is escalating, with the ratification in May of a widely-condemned law on associations that effectively criminalizes independent NGOs. Given the above, we urge the Human Rights Council to call on Egypt to repeal the law, and develop a legislative framework that creates a safe environment for Egyptian civil society. We also call on the Human Rights Council to urge the Egyptian authorities to work diligently toward compliance with the pledges they made by accepting UPR recommendations in 2015, and to cease the harassment and prosecution of civil society organizations and human rights defenders.
